A beneficiary of UJA-Federation, the NEQJCC works closely with the Metropolitan Council on Jewish Poverty ("Met Council"), Samuel Field/Bay Terrace Y, Parker Jewish Institute for Health Care and Rehabilitation ("Parker"), Queens Hadassah and Jewish Community Relations Council of New York ("JCRC").

NEQJCC projects include maintaining a community calendar, neighborhood development, Jewish continuity including Shalom Bayit/Healthy Marriage, Lay Leadership, social action, promoting involvement and volunteer opportunities, fostering intergroup understanding and building a multi-cultural coalition. The Council combats anti-Semitism and discrimination, sponsors forums with major public figures, Jewish cultural events, open discussions with local Rabbis and represents community concerns. Its newest program, the Harmony Initiative or "Hi" represents a collaboration funded by the City Council including the Office of the Queens District Attorney, the City Commission on Human Rights and the Northeast Queens Branch-NAACP. Find more information about council programs, events, activities and advocacy, including photos, in our Statements link on our website, www.northeastqueensjewish.org.

As part of its Neighborhood Development efforts, the Council helped form the NORC-WOW, a pilot program to serve seniors in one and two family homes. The Council publishes a (four-fold, 8.5 by 14-inch) brochure, You Can Have It All, touting life in northeast Queens communities, also available through its website.

Annual programs include its Installation of Officers and Awards Reception (See the 2009 invite and the 2008 program journal) sponsored by each fall by Parker Jewish Institute for Health Care and Rehabilitation, the lighting of the largest Chanukah Menorah in Queens, Pre-Passover and Fall Food Drives sponsored by Parker Jewish Institute for Health Care and Rehabilitation and Met Council, a Purim Carnival, at the Samuel Field Y and participation in the annual Salute to Israel parade.

Each Spring, the Council holds its Annual Legislative Forum, co-sponsored by Parker, Met Council, JCRC and Queens Region-Hadassah, at the Samuel Field Y. In 2002 and 2004, the Council, together with Queens Hadassah and the Consulate of Israel, hosted the Ben Yeduda Street Comes to Bayside, an Israeli Gifts Fair, which attracted thousands of visitors who purchased direct from Israeli merchants and listened to Israeli entertainers. In celebration of Israel's 60th, Hadassah and NEQJCC organized a 2008 Ben Yeduda fair and concert.

Outstanding Service to the Community of Queens

Honorable Archie H. Spigner

Councilman Archie Spigner, a member of the City Council from 1974 to 2001, represented the Southeast Queens communities of Hollis, Jamaica, Queens Village, St. Albans, Addisleigh Park, Rosedale, and Cambria Heights. Councilman Spigner rose to the post of Deputy Majority Leader, its second highest position. His legislative responsibilities included Chair of the Legislative Office of Budget Review and the Committees on Economic Development and Housing and Buildings. He also served on the Council's Budget Negotiating Team and was liaison for the Council's 14 member Queens Delegation. He was elected to the Board of the National League of Cities, the major advocacy



group for our nation's urban areas, where he served on its Advisory Board.

Archie sponsored a wide range of local laws. His laws established the Environmental Control Board, Business Improvement Districts, Economic Development Zones, and penalties against non-conforming uses in residential areas. He also increased penalties for illegal conversions, created tax abatements for residential housing and unit pricing in drugs stores, passed tougher fire, construction, and lead paint safety regulations and increased participation of minority and women owned businesses for city contracts.

Archie's leadership efforts in the community led to the construction of the York College campus, the Addabbo Federal Office Building, the Archer Avenue subway, the Jamaica Multi-Service Center and health clinics throughout Southeast Queens. Archie's leadership as chair of the Council's Housing and Building Committee resulted in the building of thousands of new housing units throughout the City, including a large number in Southeast Queens. In fact, under his Chairmanship, the City's five billion dollar housing programs was started. He also secured funding for new streets and sewers, schools and libraries.

A past Chair of the Queens United Negro College Fund, Archie serves as a Board Member of the Boy Scouts Campaign of America, the Queens Botanical Gardens and United Black Men of Queen. He is a Life Time Member of the NAACP Jamaica Branch; Trustee of Jamaica Hospital, a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and the Lutheran Church of the Resurrection in St. Albans.

Before his election to the City Council, Archie Signer was active in Amalgamated Transportation Union Local 1056. As a labor activist Archie worked closely with A. Philip Randolph in the formation of the Negro American Labor Council, which fought to open up trade unions and apprenticeship opportunities for African Americans.

As Executive Member and District Leader of the Guy R. Brewer United Democratic Club, Archie was instrumental in electing the first African-American Supreme Court Justice, Assembly Member, State Senator and Congress Member in the Borough of Queens. In addition, Spigner played a key role in the campaigns of Mayor David Dinkins, Percy Sutton, Carl McCall, Rev. Jesse Jackson, Rev. Floyd Flake, William Thompson, Helen Marshall, Barack Obama, and numerous others.

He believes in a strong public education system and funded capital improvements for a significant number of schools. Councilman Spigner is a graduate of Queens College where he also did post graduate work.

Archie is married to Leslie Spigner, a retired school teacher who is very involved in political and civic activities. They reside in Addisleigh Park, Jamaica, NY. He was also married to the late Christine Spigner. He has a son, grandson, two great-granddaughters and two-step sons.

She has participated in Project Hope food delivery to the elderly and has marched in the Israeli Day Parade since 2007.

Outside of school and BBYO, she has participated in the C.L.A.S.S.P program (Consortia for Learning and Service to Special Populations) and works as an after-school program counselor at P.S. 169 in Bay Terrace. She has spent the last 8 summers at Camp Lohikan as a camper, Counselor in Training, and Junior Counselor. At camp, she is an instructor of the circus arts program, specializing in the flying trapeze. Samantha is currently applying for fall 2010 college admissions and plans to continue making a difference in her community and inspiring others around her to do the same.

David Slotnick

David Slotnick started working at the Samuel Field Y when he was 16 years old and has worked at the Y full-time since 1993, where he started as the Director of Children's Services at the Bay Terrace Center.

David has been the Program Director of Youth and Camping Services at the Y for the past nine years.

He oversees children and youth programming for the entire agency, including Little Neck, Bay Terrace and 8 of the Y's off-site programs, which include nearly 1500 participants and 300 staff.

In addition, David oversees many of the Y's summer camping programs, which include nearly 600 children between the ages of 5 and 15 years old.

He is also responsible for the oversight of the Y's Teen Program, which consists of providing job training opportunities and academic support systems.

On a personal note, David has been married to wife, Michele, for 15 years. They has two children, Sierra and Miranda, who attend programs at the Samuel Field Y and Hebrew School at Bellerose Jewish Center.
